
As we move into the Summer you will get to meet the Network Core Team who will be working and visiting Network members.

Shaping the Answer Conference – May 2023



On May 16th WMIN hosted its inaugural Network Annual Conference in Solihull. 'Shaping the Answer' welcomed over 120 attendees from across the Network.

We were delighted to welcome clinical and service leaders as keynote speakers to help frame the day and that so many of the delegates joined in with the interactive workshop sessions.

Our Keynote Speakers

Dr Kath Halliday was the first speaker of the day and shared an overview of the work of the RCR and shared their vision for the coming years. Kath identified some key themes including the changing workforce dynamics, and the challenge of retaining and ensuring a diverse workforce continues to evolve.

Kath also spoke about the importance of Al and the RCR's role in ensuring the industry has the most appropriate solutions. The RCR often advises the government on what the industry needs, what will make a difference and provides reassurance for colleagues on what is best to use.

The afternoon agenda kicked off with Kim Robertson, NHSE Head of Imaging Transformation. The main component of her work is in support of the National Imaging Strategy and the ongoing development of Imaging Networks across England.

Kim highlighted that demand continues to rise against a backdrop of chronic staff vacancy rates. The cost of imaging services is rising annually, and the cost of outsourcing doubled in 2021/22.

Kim also highlighted the importance of the National Imaging Data Collection and how it can inform decision making.

We were also delighted to hear from Holly Warriner (QSI Programme Manager) and Sally Walker (QI partner, RCR), who discussed the necessities of QSI. Both Holly and Sally also led a very informative breakout session.

Steve Halliday, Network Digital Transformation Director & Dr Marius Grima, (Consultant Radiologist, UHNM and Chair of Digital SIG) talked through the vision for the digital solution for the Network.

This is one of the biggest programmes of work to be undertaken by the network in the coming months and we look forward to working with you all on it.

Finally, there was a presentation on the benefits of collaboration by Elaine Gilliland (System Lead for Diagnostics, Black Country ICB) and Nicole Dacosta (Transformation Manager, Coventry and Warwickshire ICB), with an important summary on Community Diagnostic Centres, which sparked some useful conversations

This Year's UKIO Conference



This year's UKIO conference was held in Liverpool over three days, the 5th to the 7th of June.

It was an exciting conference with well over 300 delegates attending over the three days.

There were a great mix of clinical and process presentations. There were two main themes that ran through the conference this year.

Firstly, the use of AI in imaging services. There were many presentations on the benefits of introducing AI, both of workload management/process improvement and quality of reporting. Using AI in imaging covers a multitude of applications, and process. Some presentations referenced the speed of development of AI, and therefore had

some uncertainty out the future. Many of the manufacturer stands in the exhibition area were focused on showing some of these exciting possibilities. Accompanied by our networks digital strategy this gives us a great opportunity rephrase the way imaging is provided.

The second and perhaps relatable theme was workforce. The theme running through this was about both professional development and capacity. Workforce remains the biggest risk on the West Midlands Imaging Network risk register; and its clear other Trusts and Networks concerns. There were share those discussions about how we retain our best assets; there was a presentation on the Society and College of Radiographers work on RePAIR, which is work on retention in radiotherapy; however some of the themes are clearly transferable and





we will be working with our workforce SIG and the leads on the RePAIR programme to share that learning.

There was a key presentation on patient experience. Two senior healthcare professionals shared their experiences of becoming a patient on a cancer pathway. One patient told of his journey and how this life-changing experience has altered his approach to everything he now does. These were incredibly powerful, and I think the team reflected on how our individual interactions with patients and their carers could improve. It's often the small things people do that stay with patients the longest.

The opening address by Dr Partha Kar talked about the power of data to change attitudes and approach; and how clinicians don't always use that power to call out poor attitudes and approaches. We were

pleased to see our network colleagues Dr Richard Szabranski (pictured) who delivered a talk on digital technology and Sarah Prescott spoke on the issues surrounding MRI physics and radiation protection.

Overall this was an amazing three days packed with learning, discussion and reflection.




New Special Interest Groups Kicks Off a Busy July
